The driving questions of this PBL were:

- -What is a sentence?

- -What are the parts of the sentence?
- -What are the kinds of sentences?


This PBL lasted seven days. It included an internet search, integrating visual arts, an oral report creative design discussions, a show and tell, and a read-aloud to share the product. Although a seven day PBL lesson plan can seem to be short, it was long enough to give students the opportunity to experience a different learning method. It is very helpful to integrate diverse learning styles, to spark curiosity, and to promote more independent initiatives towards their own learning.

My responsability as a teacher is not merely teaching memorization of the mechanics of concrete skills, but to spark a learning curioristy that makes the students able to learn on their own, to wonder, to ask themselves and others, to explore, to grow and become who they are meant to be.

If the students leave the classroom with less enthusiasm and less curiosity, I have failed them. I hope this PBL sparked some curiosity in the students towards the process of creating a book and expressing their deas creatively.



It's hard to be a sentence! I want to be a happy sentence, but I can't.





Why can't you be a happy sentence?





Kids forget that I always begin with a capital letter.





The predicate tells you about what I am doing.





I can be an interrogative sentence, a sentence that asks a question. If I am an interrogative sentence, I end with a question mark.





I can be an exclamatory sentence, a sentence that expresses a strong feeling. If I am an exclamatory sentence, I end with an exclamation mark.





What can I do to make you happy?



Can you remember to write me correctly?




Keidy Ramos Cabrera Yes. I will write you with a capital letter at the beginning.
